



OHIO AUDITOR OF STATE Keith Faber

Serving as Ohio's 33rd Auditor of State, Keith Faber is dedicated to ensuring efficient, effective and transparent government for the people of Ohio.

From 2008-2018, Auditor Faber served Ohioans in the state legislature, including as President of the Ohio Senate. Auditor Faber earned a reputation for restraining state spending, lowering taxes and advocating for more transparent, accountable government.

Some notable legislative accomplishments that will translate to his role as Auditor of State include:

- Asking colleges and universities to reduce the cost of a degree by five percent through the Ohio Senate President's 5% Challenge. This resulted in statewide average savings of 12 percent for students
- Streamlining the public records mediation process by making public records more accessible and affordable to the public through the Court of Claims
- Introducing legislation to increase the number of performance audits and allow the legislature to review state agencies

As Auditor, Faber will hold elected officials who lie, cheat, steal taxpayer dollars to account. He will root out fraud, waste and abuse in government. He will increase the number of performance audits on state agencies, bringing more efficiency and savings to tax payers. Finally, Auditor Faber will make government work better, faster and cheaper while improving customer service for Ohioans.

Auditor Faber earned his undergraduate degree from Oakland University and his Juris Doctorate from the Ohio State University Moritz College of Law. After working in the private sector, he opened his own firm, Faber and Associates LLC.

He and his wife, Andrea, have two children and live in Celina, Ohio.





OHIO AUDITOR OF STATE OFFICE OVERVIEW

MISSION

The Auditor of State's office strives to make government more transparent, efficient and accountable by demanding effective customer service for those we serve, Ohio taxpayers. We operate by the book and always seek the truth. Ohioans deserve governments that are held to the highest standard; and that is what we will deliver.

The Office

As one of five independently elected statewide offices under Ohio's Constitution, the Auditor of State verifies that your hard earned tax-dollars are used appropriately and efficiently.

With a statewide staff of more than 800 auditors and other professionals, the Auditor of State's office is responsible for auditing all public offices in Ohio – more than 5,900 entities – including cities, counties, villages, townships, schools, state universities and public libraries as well as all state agencies, boards and commissions.

The Auditor's office also offers performance auditing for state and local public offices, identifies and investigates fraud in public agencies, provides financial services for local governments and promotes transparency in government.

OFFICE ORGANIZATION

Auditor Keith Faber and his senior staff direct the Auditor of State's office in its mission to provide clean, accountable and efficient government to Ohioans. The office includes seven divisions:

Administration

- **Human Resources Department** — performs all personnel related duties within the office including recruiting, payroll processing and managing all employee benefits.
- **Finance Department** — responsible for all financial and cost-management functions for the office including payroll, purchasing, accounts receivable, accounts payable, facilities and fleet management, and budget and financial reporting.
- **Information Technology (IT)** — develops and maintains the technology and administrative services in the office giving employees.
- **Uniform Accounting Network** — provides computerized, integrated financial management and information system serving local governments. UAN provides entities with the software, technology, training and support for public officials to apply required accounting standards to their financial record keeping.

Legal

- **Legal Division** — offers legal guidance to the team of auditors who represent the Auditor of State's office when working with state and local entities. The legal department provides relevant legal authority to constituents to share with their respective legal counsel concerning matters related to an audit.
- **Open Government Unit** — provides local officials and citizens with the training and resources to help them better understand their rights and obligations under the Ohio Public Records Act and the Ohio Open Meetings Act. Staff attorneys from the office's Legal Division and a full-time paralegal serve as the office's experts on public records and open meetings. At the request of local officials and office offers training seminar and other educational resources on Sunshine laws.

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Financial Audit

- **Financial Audit Section** — conducts financial audits of all public entities as required under Ohio law. Generally, the Auditor of State's office is required to perform these financial audits at least once every two fiscal years. The office must review the methods, accuracy and legality of the accounts, financial reports, records and files of all public entities.
- **Medicaid/Contract Audit Section** — ensures that Ohio's Medicaid dollars are not illegally spent or wasted by those working under contracts with state agencies.
- **Center for Audit Excellence** — develops auditing standards of practice and quality assurance based upon national standards and Ohio law. Through regular trainings, the center ensures that all employees working for the Auditor of State are up-to-date on these standards.
- **Local Government Services Section** — serves as a consulting and fiscal advisory group to all governmental agencies and subdivisions. It provides an array of services including, but not limited to, financial forecasts, GAAP conversion assistance, annual financial report processing, record reconstruction and reconciliation, fiscal watch or emergency assistance and financial management training for elected officials.

Performance Audit

- **Ohio Performance Team** — Conducts performance audits of any government seeking to improve operations, identify cost savings and produce sustainable, balanced budgets. Additionally, AOS is required by state law to conduct at least four performance audits of state agencies each biennium. Unlike financial audits where the focus is on an agency's past activities, this team ensures efficient use of Ohio's tax dollars by functioning like a consulting group with a proactive, forward focus. The team identifies areas of inefficiency or low effectiveness in public-sector entities and provides recommendations for corrective action. AOS is also authorized to conduct a performance audit for any school district or local government in fiscal caution, fiscal watch or fiscal emergency. Our results help entities in fiscal distress improve the cost effectiveness of operations and resolve their financial difficulties.

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Policy

- **Policy and Legislative Affairs Division** — serves as a link between the Auditor of State's office and the Ohio General Assembly. This section ensures that state senators and representatives understand the duties and needs of the office and also provides legislators with the necessary information to make well-informed decisions on legislation affecting the Auditor of State's office.

Public Integrity

- **Public Integrity Assurance Team** — promotes clean, ethical government; exposes corruption and wrongdoing where it exists, and assists law enforcement and prosecutors in the pursuit of justice. The team brings together the former Special Audit Section, Special Investigations Unit and portions of the Auditor of State's legal staff as one team with one mission. Comprised of forensic auditors, investigators and attorneys, the team has decades of experience and working relationships with law enforcement at the local, state and federal levels. Their expertise allows them to take a case from an initial complaint through conclusion. In cases where local officials have conflicts that make them unable to conduct investigations, the PIAT brings independence.

Public Affairs

- **Public Affairs Division** — serves as a liaison between the Auditor of State's office and the news media. The section is responsible for all internal and external communications and publications. Public Affairs also issues news releases and manages the content of the office's Web site, ensuring that the public at large – through the news media and the internet – has timely, accurate information about the activities of the office.

- **Regional Liaisons** — provide field operations in each of the Auditor of State's nine local offices: Akron, Athens Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton, Toledo, Youngstown and the state region. The liaisons serve as a link between the Auditor of State's office and the general public, local officials and constituents.
