To the Members of Council:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Family and Children First Council, Belmont County, Ohio (the Council), as of and for the years ended December 31, 2002 and 2001. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Council's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described Note 2, the Council prepares its financial statements on the basis of accounting prescribed or permitted by the Auditor of State, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the combined fund cash balances of the Family and Children First Council, Belmont County, as of December 31, 2002 and 2001, and its combined cash receipts and disbursements for the years then ended on the basis of accounting described in Note 2.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated August 8, 2003, on our consideration of the Council's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

The accompanying Schedule of Federal Awards Expenditures is presented for additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations,* and is not a required part of the financial statements. We subjected this information to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements. In our opinion, it is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2002 AND 2001

1. DESCRIPTION OF ENTITY

Ohio Rev. Code Section 121.37 created the Ohio Family and Children First Cabinet Council and required the Board of County Commissioners in each County to establish County Family and Children First Councils. A Board of County Commissioners may invite any local public or private agency or group that funds, advocates, or provides services to children to have a representative become a permanent or temporary member of its County Council. Each County Council must include the following individuals:

- a. At least three individuals whose families are or have received services from an agency represented on the Council or another County's Council. Where possible, the number of members representing families shall be equal to twenty percent of the Council's membership;
- b. The Director of the Board of Alcohol, Drug Addiction, and Mental Health Services that serves the County, or, in the case of a county that has a Board of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services and a Community Mental Health Board, the Directors of both Boards. If a Board of Alcohol, Drug Addiction, and Mental Health Services covers more than one county, the Director may designate a person to participate on the County's Council;
- c. The Health Commissioner, or the Commissioner's designee, of the Board of Health of each city and general health district in the County. If the County has two or more health districts, the Health Commissioner membership may be limited to the Commissioners of the two districts with the largest populations;
- d. The Director of the County Department of Job and Family Services;
- e. The Executive Director of the county agency responsible for the administration of children services pursuant to Section 5153.15 of the Revised Code;
- f. The Superintendent of the County Board of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities;
- g. The County's Juvenile Court Judge senior in service or another judge of the juvenile court designated by the administrative judge, or, where there is no administrative judge, by the judge senior in service;
- h. The Superintendent of the city, exempted village, or local school district with the largest number of pupils residing in the County, as determined by the Department of Education, which shall notify each Board of County Commissioners of its determination at least biennially;
- i. A School Superintendent representing all other school districts with territory in the County, as designated at a biennial meeting of the superintendents of those districts;
- j. A representative of the municipal corporation with the largest population in the County;
- k. The President of the Board of County Commissioners, or an individual designated by the Board;
- I. A representative of the regional office of the Department of Youth Services;

- m. A representative of the County's Head Start agencies, as defined in Section 3301.31 of the Revised Code;
- n. A representative of the County's early intervention collaborative established pursuant to the federal early intervention program operated under the "Education of the Handicapped Act Amendments of 1986"; and
- o. A representative of a local nonprofit entity that funds, advocates, or provides services to children and families.

A County Council shall provide for the following:

- a. Referrals to the Cabinet Council of those children for whom the Council cannot provide adequate services;
- Development and implementation of a process that annually evaluates and prioritizes services, fills service gaps where possible, and invents new approaches to achieve better results for families and children;
- c. Participation in the development of a countywide, comprehensive, coordinated, multi-disciplinary, interagency system for infants and toddlers with developmental disabilities or delays and their families, as established pursuant to federal grants received and administered by the department of health for early intervention services under the "Education of the Handicapped Act Amendments of 1986";
- d. Maintenance of an accountability system to monitor the County Council's progress in achieving results for families and children; and
- e. Establishment of a mechanism to ensure ongoing input from a broad representation of families who are receiving services within the County system.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Basis of Accounting

These financial statements follow the basis of accounting prescribed or permitted by the Auditor of State, which is similar to the cash receipts and disbursements basis of accounting. Receipts are recognized when received in cash rather than when earned, and disbursements are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred.

These statements include adequate disclosure of material matters, as prescribed or permitted by the Auditor of State.

B. Fund Accounting

The Council uses fund accounting to segregate cash and investments that are restricted as to use. The Council classifies its funds into the following types:

B. Fund Accounting (Continued)

1. General

The General Fund is the general operating fund. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

2. Special Revenue Funds

These funds are used to account for proceeds from specific sources that are restricted to expenditure for specific purposes. The Council had the following Special Revenue Funds:

Help Me Grow Fund – This fund receives federal and state monies from the Ohio Department of Health as it relates to the Early Intervention (Part C) and Welcome Home Components of the Help Me Grow Program. Help Me Grow is a collaborative and integrated system of services and supports to help families create an environment conducive to the growth and development of young children thereby enhancing a child's ability to learn, reducing incidences of child abuse and neglect, and supporting parent's efforts to achieve self-sufficiency.

Wellness Block Fund – This fund receives federal monies from the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services with the primary focus of preventing out-of-wedlock births amoung teens in Ohio.

Kinship Navigator Fund – This fund receives federal monies from the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services designed to improve safety, permanencies and well-being outcomes for children living with relatives through the enhancement of supportive services for caregiver including information and referral, legal services, child care, respite care, training, financial assistance and evaluation.

Ohio Children's Trust Fund – This fund receives states monies to be used to decrease the incidences of child abuse in Belmont County though public awareness and the training and placement of volunteers in child abuse/ neglect programs.

Early Start Fund – This fund receives federal and states monies from the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services as it relates to the Early Start Component of the Help Me Grow Program.

C. Administrative/Fiscal Agent

Section 121.37 (B) (4), Revised Code, requires each County Council to designate an administrative agency for the Council. The Belmont County Department of Job and Family Services serves as administrative agent for the Council, and the Belmont County Auditor is the designated fiscal agent for the Belmont County Department of Job and Family Services. Belmont County maintains Council funds in a Special Revenue Fund on the County's financial records. The administrative agent agrees to:

- a. Serve as the Council's appointing authority;
- b. Exercise spending authority within the limits of the annual budget developed and approved by the Council; and
- c. Perform the following on behalf of Council, but only upon the expressed approval of and direction by Council:

C. Administrative/ Fiscal Agent (Continued)

- Enter into written agreements or administer contracts with public or private entities to fulfill Council business;
- Provide financial stipends, reimbursements, or both, to family representatives for expenses related to Council activity; and
- Receive by gift, grant, devise, or bequest any moneys, land or other property for the purposes for which the Council is established.

D. Fund Deficits

The General Fund, Wellness Block – Special Revenue Fund, and Early Start – Special Revenue Fund had negative fund balances at December 31, 2002, of \$12,660, \$23,262, and \$91,411, respectively. While in 2001, the General Fund and Kinship Navigator – Special Revenue Fund had negative fund balances of \$12,660 and \$3,689, respectively. These deficits are due primarily to differences between projected expenditures by the Council's administrative agent and allocations received from the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) as receipted into the Belmont County Public Assistance Fund.

ODJFS guarantees reimbursement for expenditures up to an allocated amount as long as spending limits for the Council's funds are not exceeded. These reimbursements from ODJFS may occur in another fiscal year. Sufficient cash existed from other monies in the Belmont County Public Assistance Fund to meet all obligations for the Council for the period.

3. EQUITY IN POOLED CASH AND INVESTMENTS

In accordance with Ohio Revised Code, the Council's cash is held and invested by the Belmont County Treasurer, who acts as custodian for the Council's monies. The Council's assets are held in the County's cash and investment pool, and are valued at the Treasurer's reported carrying amount. The County Treasurer is responsible for securing and maintaining adequate collateral for all funds in the Belmont County cash and investment pool.

4. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Amounts received from grantor agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by the grantor, principally the federal government. Any disallowed costs may require refunding to the grantor. Amounts which may be disallowed, if any, are not presently determinable. However, based on prior experience, management believes such refunds, if any, would not be material.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Council's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Council's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, we noted another matter involving the internal control over financial reporting that does not require inclusion in this report, that we have reported to management of the Council in a separate letter dated August 8, 2003.
